

Like

1. It is similar to a preposition

like+ noun/pronoun

My sister looks **like me**
My sister looks **like my mother**

2. In Informal English we can use **like** as a conjunction.

Nobody speaks English **like she does**

like

3. **Like** is used to mean "typical or characteristic of "

That's **just like my mother** to be so absent-minded.

It **is not like him** to be late

As

1. It is a conjunction

as+clause /preposition

Nobody speaks English **as she does**
In spring , **as in summer**, it is quite hot

As is used in expressions like **as we agreed**, **as you know**, **as you suggested**, to introduce facts that are common ground

2. It is a preposition

As is used to say what function or role a person or thing has- what jobs people do, what purposes things are used for....

I work **as a teacher**

She used her hairpin **as a key**

as

1. You can use Look like, look as if, look as though to make comparison with no difference in meaning

It **looks like** it's going to rain

It **looks as if** it's going to rain

It **looks as though** it's going to rain

2. To give examples you can use **like** or **such as**

She likes different kinds of music **like/such as** pop, rock, hip hop...etc

Compare this use of **as** and **like**

As your friend, I suggest you to forget it (= I am your friend)

Like your friend, I suggest you to forget it (= I am not your friend , but he and I have similar attitudes)
