would rather

Would rather or '*d rather* is used to talk about preferring one thing to another. It has two different constructions.

I. SAME SUBJECT

Positive: I would rather go to bed

Negative: I would rather not eat in this restaurant

Question: Would you rather eat at home or in a restaurant?

 When we want to refer to the past, we use would rather+ have+Past Participle

She'd rather have studied to be a doctor (but she is an engineer)

2. DIFFERENT SUBJECT

• We use the Past Simple to refer to the present or future

I would rather / I'd rather (that) you didn't speak so loudly.

He would rather/he'd rather she didn't drink that much

• We use the Past perfect to talk about the past

I'd rather **she had told** me the truth

WOULD RATHER ... THAN

we say *would rather ... than I'd* **rather** drive a hybrid car **than** an electric cart **She'd rather** phone him **than** write an email

SHORT RESPONSES WITH WOULD RATHER NOT Would you like to dance?

I'd rather not. Thanks.

would sooner= would rather

Would rather is much more common
